2021 budget, levy pass unanimously

RED WING — The City Council approved the proposed 2021 levy and budget during a special meeting on Monday.

The levy was set at \$22,863,588. This is a \$795,255 or 3.36% decrease from the preliminary property tax levy, which was adopted on Tuesday, Sept. 8. The BUDGET: Page 3

2021 property tax levy is also down \$500,000 or 2.14% from 2020's property tax levy of \$23,363,588.

The city's 2021 expenditures budget was set at \$90,154,135. This is an increase of about \$3.7 million from 2020.

A more accommodating airport experience

Minnesota group making it happen

Start seeing sunflowers. Travelers passing through Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport now have the option of wearing a lanyard with sunflower logos to indicate to airport security and others that they have a "hidden disability" such as vision or hearing impairpost-traumatic stress disorder.

MSP is among seven other airports in the U.S. to join the global Hidden Disabilities Sunflower program, thanks in part to the efforts of the Dementia-Friendly Airports Working Group. The Twin Cities-area group advo-cates for policies to make air travel more accom-modating for people with dementia and their caregivers.

Wearing a hidden disabilities sunflower is a way for people with disabilities to keep their independence, and not a pass ment, autism, epilepsy or to skip security lines, said

UTV fatal accident reported

A Cannon Falls man died Sunday when his UTV rolled on Sunset Trail. The Goodhue County Sheriff's Office received a report on Dec. 6 of a UTV side-byside rollover accident at 13300 Sunset Trail on the Cannon Falls Township/

Tix was pronounced dead at the scene.

screening passengers with dementia. The recommendations shared with TSA agents nationwide over two weeks in October.


